

Virginia Governor Rejects Adult-Use Cannabis Sales Legislation

Republican Governor Glenn Youngkin asserts ‘Cannabis poses risks to Virginians’ and raises concerns about the potential impact of legalization on youth health and safety in his veto message

1. Delay in Access to Regulated Adult-Use Cannabis
