

Schumer's Bold Move: Bill Filed to Federally Legalize Cannabis

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Senate Finance Committee Chairman Ron Wyden (D-OR), and Sen. Cory Booker (D-NJ) lead a coalition of Democratic senators in reintroducing a bill aimed at federally legalizing cannabis.

Unveiling the Cannabis Administration and Opportunity Act (CAOA)
