

DEA Head Refrains from Cannabis Rescheduling Comment Amid Ongoing Process

The head of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Anne Milgram, appeared before lawmakers to discuss the agency's recent determination on marijuana rescheduling but refrained from commenting on the ongoing administrative process.

Smart Approaches to Marijuana Raises Questions

Milgram's Testimony

Former DEA Administrator's Perspective

Former DEA Administrator Asa Hutchinson weighed in on the rescheduling proposal, calling it understandable and reflective of public sentiment toward the medical value of cannabis.

Political Reactions

While some Democrats see the rescheduling as a positive step, a Republican senator criticized efforts to legalize marijuana, arguing that it would stimulate more crime.
